### Greene County ESC Now Offers Educational Audiology

We are pleased to announce that Greene County Educational Service Center has now added Educational Audiology to our growing list of services. Our new audiologist, Dr. Kyle Raterman, received his bachelor's degree from the University of Dayton and his doctorate degree (Au.D.) from Nova Southeastern University.

Dr. Raterman previously worked at the Loyola University Medical Center in Chicago, IL, where he provided comprehensive audiological services for both pediatric and adult populations. He has extensive experience with complex diagnostics, hearing aid fittings/adjustments, cochlear implant evaluations and mappings, assistive listening technology including FM and soundfield systems, and counseling. He is excited to be working for GCESC and is enjoying his role as educational audiologist.

Dr. Raterman's services at **GCESC** include comprehensive audiological/hearing evaluations, auditory processing evaluations, assistive technology setup and training (FM and soundfield), classroom acoustics assessments and recommendations, teacher training and in-services, and counseling for students and parents. He is well-educated in regards to the effects of hearing loss on learning and academics, and he strives to be the best audiological advocate and consultant for all the districts within Greene County.

The elementary INC classroom was busy in October rolling in the fall leaves, and making crafts that coincided with Halloween. The students have been working during teacher time on reading and story time, and they continue to enjoy using the Interactive Whiteboard to encourage letter formations, spelling of names, and color recognition. In November, we have been incorporating "PLAY" strategies in our day-to-day schedules to encourage social -emotional and developmental growth within each child. We continue our work with increasing communication through a variety of systems. Some students are beginning to articulate words/word sounds, while others are able to communicate exclusively through signs, icons, and communication devices.

### High School INC Welcomes Transitions and Additions

After the first quarter, the high school INC program has welcomed several positive changes.

We have introduced two new students to the classroom, one of whom is receiving music therapy. As a staff, we are excited to learn along with our students all about the strategies associated with this particular support; we then carry over the music therapy techniques into the rest of the classroom so our other students may benefit from these rhythmic musical therapies. who will be graduating in February and another student transitioning up from the middle school unit in December.

In the spirit of working diligently to extend the independence of our students, we work regularly on self-care and also push for greater independence when performing their vocational duties, such as collecting daily attendance and lunch cards, vacuuming, collecting building recycling, the shredding of confidential documents, all in addition to their daily teacher time and academic work job on their respective schedules. During the second quarter, the Outdoor Advantage program participated in many activities with the larger unit on the environment students were studying. Those activities range from going creeking with a Naturalist from Greene County Parks, to creating pamphlets on various presentation on strategies ways to recycle. ### **Academy of Greene County Focuses on Developing Skills**

This quarter, students have focused on skills. Students have chosen many intriguing books to investigate. We have also developed a variety of ways to relate these books to others.

Our Geometry class has continued to investigate many rules and terms that will help us apply geometric principles to the world around us. We are also gearing up for the End-of-Course state exams, which are approaching swiftly.

Our sophomores recently investigated career options through the Greene County Career Center. On Nov. 29, some of our students toured the facility and further investigated future careers and job opportunities.

We have also been focusing on regulating our emotions and managing our anger through descriptive "zones," with the "Zones of Regulation" construct. Our whole class has begun recognizing and defining our "triggers" – those things that can provoke a response or elevate our emotions. We will continue to work on this work, as part of our socialemotional growth objectives.
