Related Services Collaborate to Promote Learning

Did you know that physical activity increases brain function? Research has shown that when children become more physically active, their expressive output increases. Motivating physical activities can be used as a tool to elicit a variety of language skills. Children can respond to questions and make requests. They have to listen to oral directions and understand a variety of vocabulary/concepts. During group activities, children have to take turns and respond in reciprocal social exchanges. Language is easily incorporated into every daily activity, including physical therapy goals that assist with body strength, balance, and coordination. Additionally, learning and development are often best accomplished in the context of engaging play and multi-sensory activities.

Approximately 65 percent of the population learns best by seeing it (visual learners), about 30 percent learn by hearing it (auditory learners), and about 5 percent learn by doing it (kinesthetic learners). So what better way to approach learning than by combining all three!

As a preschool-based SLP, Diane Bowers, MACC-SLP, has the luxury of working directly with the PT and OT on a daily basis, an opportunity many school therapists aren't afforded. With that in mind, this year the PT, Nick Schetter, DPT, and Ms. Bowers have joined forces in collaborating and creating combined gross motor/ communication groups.

The first lesson together proved to be a huge success (with some fine tuning along the way)! Based on the popular preschool story and song, <u>We're</u> <u>Going on a Bear Hunt</u>, the group took a speech walk to look for the speech snake that had escaped from Ms. Bowers' room.

In the weeks leading up to this lesson, Ms. Bowers incorporated Greg and Steve's "Going on a Bear Hunt" song during speech and language groups to introduce and review targeted spatial locations. Then, Mr. Schetter and Ms. Bowers developed a story using a similar format and cadence to the song. They incorporated familiar obstacles using real

photographs to create a visual scene along with actual pictures of each obstacle (ex. the floor ladder became train tracks, stairs led to the top of a hill, the balance beam became a log in water). Throughout the lesson, the therapists were able to provide multiple opportunities to answer who, what, and where questions, reinforce understanding of spatial location concepts, and practice speech sounds, following directions and turn-taking skills.

In between obstacles, Mr. Schetter made the group perform even more gross motor activities. They pretended to run away from the bats in the tunnel (i.e. running in place), swam like frogs (i.e. frog hops), smacked the water bugs off of their knees (i.e. cross taps), and dried off their wet shoes (i.e. stand on one foot).

When they reached the end, the group thought they were safe. That is, until they heard a noise and Mr. Schetter found the snake! A great time was had by all as the students ran back to their classroom with the snake chasing them from behind.

Trauma-Informed Schools February 23, 2018

Trauma is a pervasive, damaging and costly public health problem that is a nearuniversal experience for students with severe social, emotional and behavioral problems. Trauma damages the parts of the brain that students most need for school and life success. The Trauma-Informed approach helps create a safe and responsive school environment that improves self-regulation, reduces behavioral problems and enhances student engagement. By adopting a Trauma-Informed approach, schools undertake a paradigm shift at the staff and organizational level to understand, recognize and address the needs of students impacted by trauma.

Presenter: Timothy J. Callahan, Psy.D. is the Director of Mental Health Services for the Greene County Educational Service Center. He received his doctorate in clinical psychology from Wright State University School of Professional Psychology in 1989, and his undergraduate degree from Baylor University in 1985. He has worked extensively with children, teens and adults in variety of settings. Dr. Callahan is a co-author of 2009 Wounded Children, Healing Homes and was a contributing author for the 2008 Whole Life Adoption Book; both books focus on child maltreatment. He was previously Chief of Psychology for the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections, and clinical director for a large youth serving community mental health agency. Dr. Callahan has presented over 150 professional workshops and trainings relevant to work with children and teens.

Executive Functioning

March 13, 2018

Executive Functioning abilities (EF) are the foundation for school and life success, yet many students struggle to use these attention-regulation skills to sustain attention, control impulses, regulate emotions, keep information in mind, and learn from their experiences. EF deficits underlie most of the academic, social, emotional and behavioral problems we are experiencing in our schools today. EF deficits are common for people who have experienced trauma because maltreatment damages the brain in the areas responsible for attention-regulation processes. This workshop aims to help school staff to be more aware and responsive to EF deficits, employ strategies to help build EF skills, understand the role of trauma on brain development, and create trauma-informed classrooms and schools.
